# Back in Print - Tell us what you think...

Earlier this year, in an effort to save money on printing and delivery costs for the newsletter (and help the planet), the Council agreed to trial going digital with the newsletter, as have so many other organisations. A few hard copies were printed and placed in the church porch for those who did not have access to the internet, to collect in person. The newsletter was also uploaded onto the Council's website; published on social media, and we even set up a link where people could subscribe (at no cost) and receive a copy of the newsletter each month direct to their email address. We even organised a digital skills session to help people. The take up was poor on the subscription link and, unfortunately, feedback for the newsletter is minimal so we do not know how important the publication is to you.

The Council had agreed to review the newsletter in September 2024, which it did, and having taken on board some of the comments, has agreed to trial, test and review the publication again including frequency of delivery and content and return to hard copies but, given the costs and the work which goes into producing the newsletter we would welcome your feedback to establish whether it continues, what content it should include, and hopefully, to establish whether there are any budding authors out there who would like to contribute towards the copy.

# West Northants Council

#### 24-hour mental health text message service launched in Northamptonshire



Northamptonshire Integrated Care Board (ICB) along with North and West Northamptonshire Councils have partnered with charity Mental Health Innovations to offer free, confidential and 24/7 mental health support to those across the county through the charity's text messaging support service Shout.

The partnership has been funded through North and West Northamptonshire Public Health services and ICB to provide this innovative digital offer for anyone in Northamptonshire to enable them to access 24-hour mental health support, 365 days a year from their mobile phone.

People in the county can text the word 'IMATTER' to 85258 to be connected to a trained Shout Volunteer. The service is open around the clock and can help with issues such as anxiety, stress, loneliness, depression and suicidal thoughts. The conversation, which takes place entirely by text message, aims to help the texter reach a calmer place with a plan to move forward. It will also signpost them to further support available locally.

"Providing mental health services which meet the needs of our communities is vitally important. That is why we're proud to be a part of this partnership and launch the SHOUT text messaging service in Northamptonshire. By providing digital solutions which people of all ages can access from their mobile phone, we hope to increase the number of people accessing services and receiving the support they need." *Cllr Matt Golby, Deputy Leader of the Council and Cabinet Member for Adult Care, Public Health and Regulatory Services at WNC* 

Shout is a free, confidential and anonymous service, designed to provide people with in-the-moment support. Texting Shout does not appear on phone bills and all messages are confidential unless there is concern about someone's safety. Shout is available and free in the United Kingdom.

This will include some changes to our bar area, to our loos & our kitchen.



# **Gardening Tips**

# <u>Gardening Jobs</u> <u>for November/December</u>

#### Flowers:

10

- Plant tulip bulbs in pots and borders, covering them with at least twice their depth of soil or compost (possibly for the Spring Show see page 23)
- Lift dahlia tubers after the first frost, clean them off and store in dry compost in a cool, frost-proof place
- Send off for seed catalogues and start planning what to grow next year
- Clear faded sweet peas, morning glory, and other annual climbers from their supports
- Cut down faded perennials that are looking tatty, then mulch the surrounding soil with garden compost
- Gather up and bin the fallen leaves of roses affected by black spot, so they don't carry the disease over to next year
- Replenish gravel mulch around alpines to keep the foliage clear of damp soil, which can cause rotting
- Protect plants that are borderline hardy with a thick mulch of straw or garden compost

#### Fruit and Veg:

- Take hardwood cuttings from healthy fruit bushes, including currants, blueberries and gooseberries
- Use cloches to protect winter peas, beans and salads, but leave the ends open as good ventilation is vital
- Prune autumn-fruiting raspberries to the ground after harvesting
- Plant garlic, shallots and onions in free-draining soil or raised beds, then cover with fleece
- Prune fruit bushes once dormant, including blackcurrants and gooseberries
- Plant bare-root fruit trees, bushes and canes, as long as the ground isn't too wet
- Check stored crops for signs of rot or deterioration
- Tidy up strawberry beds, cutting back old foliage and congested runners and removing any weeds

#### Greenhouse:

- Insulate greenhouse walls and roof with bubble polythene
- Make sure all tender plants are safely under cover and kept frost free
- Check greenhouse plants regularly for overwintering pests
- Scrub down greenhouse staging, glazing and the framework with disinfectant
- Water indoor pots of spring bulbs frequently so they never dry out
- Wash out all empty pots and trays and store neatly under greenhouse staging, ready for use in spring
- Bring potted herbs, such as parsley and chives, indoors to continue cropping into winter
- Monitor greenhouse temperatures with a max-min thermometer and turn on heating if needed
- Avoid splashing foliage when watering, as it will dry slowly in cool weather and fungal diseases may set in

# **Biodiversity**

# **Biodiversity November/December 2024**

On September 21<sup>st</sup>, 2021, I walked through West Haddon Churchyard and made a note of the wildflowers there. I counted 24 different species, my favourites being Fox and Cubs {many} and Toadflax {a little}. On September 21<sup>st</sup>, 2024, I made the same walk and what a difference! Some Hawkbit, one sprig of white Clover and little else. Granted the weather was not the same, cold, wet and the grass newly mown. All was neat and tidy. The Bishop of Norwich made headlines in February saying, 'Make churchyards for the living, not just the dead.' The Church of England has made a target of net-zero by 2030, part of this being a response to the biodiversity crisis. If some parts of the churchyard are not mown the ancient sward will flower again, maybe with rare species. The primary role of churchyards is to provide burial grounds for the dead with public access and consideration for mourners. West Haddon Churchyard is a haven of peace, and may it continue so, but limited mowing of designated areas could be managed. The question being how to mark them out.

Times are not easy, the media bombards us with woeful news. However, I remember the war years and the cheerful front people kept up especially in front of the children. In view of this the Biodiversity Group has a plan for a joyful occasion for everyone: <u>a Spring Flower Show in the Village Hall.</u> Growing bulbs / Spring Flowers is an act of faith and hope, so let's do it!





Suggestions for April Flowering Plants: daffodils/narcissus glory of the snow grape hyacinths crocuses early tulips hyacinths

Suggestions for containers: Any kind of container, waterproofed baskets, coal scuttles, buckets for sandcastles, biscuit tins or your very best bowl or traditional clay pot. Just have a go.

# **YORKSHIRE PUDDINGS**

Yorkshire pudding is made by pouring a batter — made from milk, flour and eggs — into hot beef dripping, lard, or other fats, (from which it gains its flavour), into a preheated baking pan and baking in a hot oven.

When wheat flour came into common use for making cakes and puddings, cooks devised a means of making use of the fat that dropped into the dripping pan to cook a batter pudding while the meat roasted.

A type of Dripping Pudding had been cooked in England for centuries, although these puddings were much flatter than the puffy versions made in modern times. It has been suggested that the puffy version of the pudding got the name 'Yorkshire' due to the region's association with coal and the higher temperatures this produced which helped to make the batter rise and causing the pudding to be taller and crisper. The Royal Society of Chemistry suggested in 2008 that "A Yorkshire pudding isn't a Yorkshire pudding if it is less than four inches [10 cm] tall! ". Hopefully the recipe below will help to get a good height!

Originally, the Yorkshire pudding was served as a first course with thick gravy to dull the appetite using lowcost ingredients so that the diners would not eat so much of the more expensive meat in the next course, now it is more commonly served with a full roast dinner, yum!

National Yorkshire Pudding Day has been celebrated on the first Sunday in February in Britain since 2007.

#### Ingredients:

- A pinch of salt
- 250g of plain flour
- 350ml of milk
- 4 good size eggs
- A splash of water from the kettle that's been boiled and cooled.

Make as early as you can and keep whisking throughout the day until you use it.

- Put salt, flour, eggs and milk in a mixing bowl give it a good whisk for a good couple of minutes then add the splash of water and whisk again.
- Cover up and whisk throughout the day until ready to use and whisk just before it goes into the oven.
- Lightly grease an oven proof dish or Yorkshire pudding tins with lard/oil and pop into oven at 200c for a good 15 mins for fat to get hot.
- Poor in the batter and put back in oven for a good 10 minutes at 200c then turn down to 180c.
- In total should take about half an hour depending on oven.

#### **Crochet Scrunchie**


Here's a simple pattern for beginners.

You will need:

- Elastic hair tie
- Yarn (as chunky as possible)
- Crochet hook 5mm



- 1. Secure the yarn onto hair tie with a slip knot. Ch 2 (counts as one treble)
- 2. Do 44 more trebles around the hair tie join with a slip stitch
- 3. Chain 2 then treble into same stitch; then 2 trebles into the top of each stitch around
- 4. Break yarn and fasten off, weave in end



Treble= yarn over, hook through and pull through yarn, yarn over and pull through two loops on hook, yarn over and pull through remaining two loops on the hook

### **The Nifty Cleaner**

#### Nearly Forgotten House Cleaning Tips.

- Make your own mothballs by mixing oil of cloves and oil of cinnamon, then soaking cotton balls in this mixture. Place the cotton balls in muslin bags and hang them in your wardrobes.
- To clean silver, place in an aluminium pan. Sprinkle with 3 tablespoons of baking soda and cover with boiling water. Let stand for 10 to 12 minutes.
- Pour some white distilled vinegar into a plastic bag and place it around the shower head so the head is completely submerged. Tie the bag around the pipe and leave it overnight. You'll find the showerhead will spray like new again in the morning.



- Tuck a bar of soap in the toe of a nylon stocking and tie it to your outdoor water tap for a fast garden cleanup.
- Rust stains from outdoor furniture can be removed from concrete by using lemon juice and rubbing with a soft linen cloth.
- To easily clean your microwave without chemicals, place 1 cup of water and 2 tablespoons of lemon juice or baking soda in a bowl. Heat on high until the mixture boils. Let steam accumulate on the walls and door of the microwave. Remove the bowl and wipe down the interior.



Since 2003, Movember has funded more than 1,250 men's health projects around the world, challenging the status quo, shaking up men's health research and transforming the way health services reach and support men.

This Movember, the month formerly known as November, there are four ways to get involved to support men's health: Grow a moustache, Move by walking or running 60 kms throughout the month, Host a Mo-ment or Mo Your Own Way with an adventure challenge of your choosing. #### Five things men should know and do when it comes to their health:

#### 1. Spend time with people who make you feel good.

Stay connected. Your mates are important and spending time with them is good for you. Catch up regularly, check in and make time.

#### 2. Talk, more.

You don't need to be an expert, and you don't have to be the sole solution, but being there for someone, listening and giving your time can be lifesaving.

#### 3. Know the numbers.

At 50, talk to your doctor about prostate cancer and whether it's right for you to have a PSA test. If you are of African or Caribbean descent or have a father or brother with prostate cancer, you should be having this conversation at 45. Know your numbers, know your risk, talk to your doctor.

#### 4. Know thy nuts. Simple!

Get to know what is normal for your testicles. Give them a check regularly and go to the doctor if something doesn't feel right.

#### 5. Move, more.

Add more activity to your day. Do more of what makes you feel good. Take a walking meeting. Park further away from the station. Get off the bus a stop or two earlier. Instead of the lift, take the stairs. Cycle to work instead of driving.

A closer view (below) of the cottages where the little girls are standing shows the wall and gateway beyond them and the cottages still standing now.





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

# **Never Mind the Weather - September 2024**

**Photo Club** 

As well as the name of our theme for September, 'Never Mind the Weather' could also have been an exhortation to go out and take photos in spite of the recent poor conditions.

We photographers are reliant on light for our images and the weather has a direct influence upon this. With that in mind we expected to see our members submit images that showed not just weather conditions but also subjects influenced by the weather.

The beauty of this month's theme is that there's always going to be weather - just poke your head out the door to see it. And when it's raining you can just take a photo of it through the window, which is what a few of our members did. This month we encouraged members to submit prints in lieu of digital images and looking at the prints that were exhibited we were reminded how good photos can look.

Whilst a couple of photos did include the sun, precipitation in its many forms - mist, rain, snow - was the subject of many of the members' submissions, perhaps echoing the type of year we've had to date. It was the latter two types of weather that were the subjects of the images voted the favourites. **Weather Seen Through Car Window** by **Trevor Jordan** is almost an abstract - rain on a windscreen distorting a view of a street with a rainbow arcing above. The frozen form of rain was captured by **David Kallmeier** in his **Snowy Walk** a minimalist shot which shows a group of walkers walking by a fence.



There was no Image of the Month section this month, instead we took the opportunity to show photos made by our members for our August challenge of 'Windows'. It seems most of us spent August pointing our cameras at windows as there were nearly 30 images to look at. This subject is so varied - all shapes, sizes, materials and ages combine to create an almost limitless range of subjects. In the end members voted for **Window, Framed** by **Adrian Chandler** - a rusty, metal frame festooned with cobwebs framing a similar window on the far side of the building.
